

A Journey of Proud and Contributing African Americans in Princeton

This series takes the participant from the degradation of slavery through a segregated Jim Crow community that survived by faith, hope, and the guidance of spirituals and gospels. In spite of centuries of hardship, a determined, forgiving, and proud community sustained its neighborhood and the town of Princeton by serving as domestics, laborers, entrepreneurs, educators, government officials, and physicians. The course will focus on slavery and the history of the African American Community in Princeton; Princeton's Men of Valor, Paul Leroy Robeson and Albert Einstein; and on spiritual and gospel appreciation. Participants will also visit the segregated cemeteries in Princeton and Hopewell and take a walking tour of the African American experience in Princeton.
